We continue our interdisciplinary examination of International Law and the First World War in this issue with the third instalment in our four-part symposium. The articles which make up this symposium, the result of a fruitful exchange among academics from the fields of history, law and legal history, each reflect different aspects and perspectives on the four-year global conflict and its influence on the development of international law in the twentieth and twenty-first centuries. The articles in this issue focus on the end of the war, with an article that retraces the development of aggression as a concept of international law prior to the Versailles Peace Treaty and a second article that analyses the Paris Peace Settlement after the Great War.
